Dear High School President, Principal, and/or Campus Minister,

Louisiana Right to Life, under the name of Joie De Vivre Media, has produced a 30-minute film called *I Lived on Parker Avenue* (ILOPA) that we are sure will leave an indelibly positive mark on your students' perspective on adoption and abortion. While these subjects are tough, especially for teenagers, this film delivers an uplifting and compassionate message of love that all students should hear. We are excited to invite your school to host a special pre-release screening of the film in the upcoming school year, preferably before March, 2018.

ILOPA is a short documentary about a mother's agony in choosing what's best, the joy of a couple starting a family, and young man's search for where his life began. It centers on the life of David Scotton, a young man who grew up in Louisiana and attended Jesuit High School, and his journey to meet his birth parents for the first time. From the revelation of David nearly being aborted to the touching reunion with his birth parents, this film has elicited an overwhelmingly positive response from high school students, faculty, and administrators who have already viewed it.

ILOPA has been submitted to film festivals across the nation and will be released publicly online at no cost on March 8, 2018. Prior to its online release we are screening the film at high schools across the country. Will you host a special showing of *I Lived at Parker Avenue* at your school?

In addition to the film's inspirational message, an ILOPA pre-release screening gives your students a chance to use their own voice for life and adoption. After the film is shown, students will be invited to connect with the film on social media, preparing them to share the film with their peers on its release date. With thousands of students sharing the film online, it is our hope the film will spread virally, touching hearts and minds across our nation. Remember, the film will be released online for free, so there is no financial interest in having your students share the film, and of course it is completely their decision whether to share or not.

Here's what we are offering: When we show the film to a school-wide audience, the screening is preceded by a brief introduction of the film by a representative of our team. Following the 30-minute film we show a brief video message from David Scotton, who thanks the students for watching and encourages them to be a voice for adoption and life in their community. Our representative then shares more about adoption and the film and then takes questions, if the school is willing to field them. Please note, the presentation can be adjusted to meet your needs.

General:

Louisiana Right to Life through Joie De Vivre Media encourages high schools and other select venues across the nation to host a school-wide special pre-release screening of the 30-minute pro-adoption and pro-life short documentary film *I Lived on Parker Avenue* prior to the film's online release on March 8, 2018. Viewers will be inspired by the uplifting message of the film and given an opportunity to use their voices to reach others with the film.

Format of Presentation:

There will be a brief introduction of the film by a representative of our team, and then the film will be shown. Following the 30-minute film we will show a brief video message from David Scotton (film's main character), who will thank the viewers for watching and encourage them to be a voice for adoption and life in their communities. Our representative will then share more about adoption and the film and allow for questions if the venue is willing to field them. The presentation can be adjusted to meet your needs.

Cost:

We ask that you cover the travel and lodging of at least one member of our team, plus \$100 to cover materials for the presentation. Further donations to support the film are encouraged and can be made to Louisiana Right to Life Educational Committee Inc, a 501c3 organization. Contact us to discuss if you cannot afford this arrangement.

Due to the time-sensitive nature of our effort to show the film in as many venues as possible prior to its online release, we are seeking larger showings of the film.
